Lobbying is influencing public officials to

-take a specific position on a piece of legislation

-take a desired action.



Three Ways to Lobby

A phone call

Email

In person (the most effective)



Have an "ask"

- co-sponsorship of a bill
- vote (yes or no) in a committee or on the floor
- be a champion or author of a bill
- educational visit or resource delivery



Successful advocacy = successful relationships

Get to know your legislator before your visit.

What are their competing priorities?

• What is the legislative and political environment?

- Heart Story to tell
- Hand Information to leave behind

Don't be afraid to say you don't know.



Lobbying Don'ts

Don't cover too many issues

Don't be argumentative

Don't expect them to be specialists

Don't do all the talking



What to do if

Your meeting request is ignored

The meeting gets off topic

The staffer is hostile to your position



Follow up, Follow up, Follow up

Send a thank you note after your visit

Answer questions or provide resources
