
There will not be a July issue of the *Keystoner* so early wishes for a wonderful summer.

AAUW BYLAWS CHANGE TO OPEN MEMBERSHIP



The time for change is now.

On April 3rd, AAUW members around the country will be voting on proposed National bylaws changes to fully open AAUW membership to anybody who supports AAUW's mission and values.

On **April 3rd**, each of you received an e-mail from vote@simplyvoting.com with your unique Elector ID and Password, required to vote. Be sure to check your SPAM or JUNK folder. Go here for more information on the Simply Voting process. Please note, voting will be open through **May 15**th.

All members without an e-mail address on file with AAUW National or who have unsubscribed from AAUW National e-mails, may request a paper ballot from National. No additional paper ballots will be sent during the voting period.

Members are asked to consider this change in 2024 for the following reasons:

- As AAUW has changed to adapt to the changing world, its <u>membership requirements have</u> <u>changed</u> many times to become more inclusive.
- This change would allow all who support our mission to stand with us.
- Those without degrees fight for gender equity just as we do. We can be stronger advocates as we learn more about their battles and their alternate paths to success.
- The AAUW Board of Directors and the Inclusion and Equity Committee both support the change and the associated campaign to pass the bylaws amendment to open membership.
- Our standing as a national organization that advances gender equity with a value of inclusion is at risk if we do not allow all who support our mission to join us.

Common questions asked by those opposing the change include the following:

• Does this devalue our support for education?

No. We can continue to change without forgetting our roots – our commitment to higher education as a path to success, our support for fellowships and grants, and more. We just will allow those who have taken parallel paths to join us as we work for gender equity.

• Won't we have to change our name?

No. We'll be "AAUW". When asked "What's AAUW?", say you are part of a national membership organization that works for gender equity and then describe your local projects and events. There's really no need to use each word from the acronym, just as YWCA, IBM, GEICO, LWV don't require an explanation.

Isn't this just a tactic to increase membership?

No. Eliminating the degree requirement alone is not likely to substantially increase membership. Changing requirements in 1987/2005 did not have a major impact. However, the requirement is counterproductive to recruiting diverse and younger members.

If you are considering not voting in this election process, we urge you to reconsider your position as taking a position not to vote is detrimental to AAUW's cause and mission because it 1) stifles your powerful voice and 2) works against pushing this change through for the organization to evolve in an effort to reflect the people we advocate on behalf of so vigorously.

Change is hard, but evolution is necessary. Without change and evolution, we run the risk of stagnancy in advocacy and an inability to connect with the very populations we fight so hard for.

Get out and vote. Make her-story.

MESSAGE FROM THE PROGRAM VICE PRESIDENT



I am just coming off the high of having concluded a very successful state conference in Harrisburg. I was proud to serve as Program Vice President and to work with a stellar team of board officers on the Conference Planning Committee. It was wonderful to see our Administrative Director Pat Byerly, who has served the State Board and branches throughout Pennsylvania for over a decade, receive the "President's Award for Exemplary Service." The whole team invested countless hours

in the planning of this conference. I am sure that a new record was set!

The purpose of the State Conference is to keep AAUW branches connected to the wider efforts to advocate for women and girls across Pennsylvania and the nation. In Harrisburg, we heard compelling addresses from state and national leaders, including Dr. Valerie Arkoosh, who leads the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services, the state's largest department, which is dedicated to providing care and support to vulnerable citizens; Dr. Kimberly Adams, an accomplished political scientist and activist, who serves on the Board of Directors for the National Organization of Women (NOW), AAUW, and the Feminist Majority Foundation; Meghan Kissell, Senior Policy Director, who leads AAUW's non-partisan and mission-driven public policy at the federal level; and, Gisele Barreto Fetterman, the Second Lady of Pennsylvania, a trail blazer in her own right, who has devoted her life to helping others, founding the Free Store in Pittsburgh which distributes household items to those in need, and 412 Food Rescue, which ensures that surplus food is delivered to the hungry.

With such a five-star line-up, it is not surprising that social media blew up after the conference! Branches shared speaker highlights and photos, students promoted AAUW on their social media accounts, summarizing conference sessions, themes and their own learning. One student, who had a chance to talk with Gisele Fetterman at the head table, was so inspired that she dashed off a column for her college newspaper. Fetterman's advice for young women:



"Take up space and put your real voice into the world. The more that people tell their stories, the more that people will be compelled to tell theirs."

In Harrisburg, we also recognized several AAUW branches celebrating their 100th year anniversary: Carlisle, Erie, Harrisburg, Johnstown, Reading and State College. Their shared histories emphasized the ability of AAUW branches to adapt and respond to changes within their communities. "The strength of AAUW," as one branch leader explained, "has been our community roots." And all would agree – especially Carlisle members— that "Feminist shenanigans" must always be in the mix!





The Learning Circles were a huge success! The conference room was a beehive of activity with members engaged in a deep dive into hands-on advocacy activities, how to attract new members, update branch bylaws with the latest revisions, learning what the Greatest Needs and Legacy Fund are all about, and discussions and questions about removing the educational requirement for AAUW membership.

We also learned about pressing new problems related to artificial intelligence, generative AI, GenAI bias and advocacy in this "new normal." As Ajla Glavassevic Lausseger explained, "AI models are generating inaccurate information, exacerbating racist and gender stereotypes against women, but more specifically, women of color. AI models repeat or mirror real-world stereotypes and disparities, but also work to amplify and reinforce them." Lausseger also teamed up with Dr. Grace Hampton to look at the intersection between Generative AI technology and career development in a session called NextGen.

AAUW PA MEMBERSHIP - GETTING NEW MEMBERS INVOLVED



The tablecloth was white polyester, long and rectangular, just the right size to fit the six-foot tables at the library where our branch met for meetings. I was told that it HAD to be washed in hot water, and it HAD to be brought to every meeting. Interest groups supplied the refreshments, so I was just responsible for the table covering. With the tablecloth came a title – Hospitality Chair! Wow! I was a brand new AAUW member, and I already had a title, a place on the board, and I had to attend every meeting. After all, the branch can't have a meeting

without a proper, recently washed, tablecloth.

It seems like such a silly thing now, and I certainly don't recommend this as the best way to get a new member involved. But the symbol of the tablecloth is that it DID get me involved with a branch of AAUW, and I have been involved ever since. Your best practice is to find some means, however large or small, that results in new members getting involved. Maybe they can take on a leadership position immediately, and maybe they need a mentor to help and guide. Could there be a place on a committee? Could there be a role that matches the person's skills and talents to a job that your AAUW branch desperately needs? Research shows that if one doesn't get involved in the first

ninety days, then that new member may be gone. Be creative and welcome that new member in a super positive way!

A couple of "housekeeping" notes:

- 1. I have learned that any free memberships that were earned by your branch this year must be used by September 30, 2024. These free memberships can be used for a new member and to renew a membership as well.
- 2. Starting April 1, the new coupon code for students who are enrolled at C/U member institutions is CUStudentFY25. This gives the student free national membership. Who are these C/U members? Good news! On the aauw.org website, under membership > join or renew > c/u member, the C/U directory for Pennsylvania now only includes schools that are paid members. I counted 31 institutions in our commonwealth; it's a good idea to check the list before signing on a new student.

Please let me know if you have any questions or concerns about membership. There's always something that can seem confusing, and we're here to help. There was so much enthusiasm for growing our membership that was shown at the April conference in Harrisburg. Let's keep that momentum going this summer!

STATE BYLAWS

2024 Proposed AAUW PA Bylaws Amendments

The AAUW PA Board of Directors and the Bylaws Committee would like to thank the membership for making suggestions to improve the proposed amendments to our current bylaws and for reviewing the proposals and voting on them. Your participation is critical.

The results of the electronic vote on the bylaws will be announced at the annual meeting on Saturday, May 4.

BRANCH BYLAWS

June 30, 2024, is the date by which the mandated changes from the national election in 2023 need to have been made. By mid-April, 16 branches had made the mandated changes and had them approved; many branches have considered making additional amendments.

If your branch has not yet made the mandated changes, it is a simple process: Copy and paste the mandated seven articles into your current bylaws, delete any duplications, have your branch board approve the changes, and then send the copy to the <u>state bylaws chair</u>, Deb Roney. Deb will review them, make sure everything is in good order, and let you know either that they are ready to be submitted or that they need some revisions. Once everything is finalized and returned, Deb will send that copy to National on your behalf.

Optionally, your branch may elect to make additional revisions to your bylaws to bring them up to date with current policies, practices, and needs. Consider such changes AFTER your mandated changes have been made and approved. These sorts of changes need approval in advance by the state bylaws committee and then a vote of your branch membership. There is NO deadline on making these optional changes, and Deb is happy to consult with you about possible proposed changes.

Thanks to the branch bylaws chairs and presidents for seeing to this task. It requires patience and persistence, and we are grateful that our branches are showing both.


It is only fitting that we immortalize his words on our anniversary shirt! The shirts are in women's sizes. <u>Click here to order</u>. Deadline to order is May 11.

AAUW State College to Hold 62nd Used Book Sale May 11-14

The annual AAUW State College Used Book Sale will be held **May 11-14** at the Penn State Snider Ag Arena (800 East Park Avenue in State College), located diagonally across from Beaver Stadium at the corner of East Park Avenue and Fox Hollow Road.

This year's sale is held in memory of former branch member Louise Tukey, a 73-year member of AAUW State College, who passed away this January. She was a founding member of the first sale, which took place in 1962.

The books offered at the event are generously donated by local community members in the ten months prior to the sale. AAUW members sort and price the books at their Used Book Workshop. The sale runs 9:00 am – 8:00 pm Saturday, May 11 through Monday, May 13th. On May 14th, the final day, the sale closes at 7 pm.



With an estimated 200,000 books for sale, the sale is one of the largest such events in the country. Books are individually priced and sorted into 30+ categories.

Monday, May 13 is Half Price Day and Tuesday, May 14 is Bag Day, when a bag of books may be purchased for \$10. Shoppers are asked to bring their own recyclable shopping bags. We are all about reuse and recycling!

The 2023 May sale netted nearly \$135,000 after expenses. It is a community-wide effort that engages many volunteers from throughout the community, working hand in hand with AAUW branch members. Sale proceeds are awarded to local groups running projects that advance equity for women and girls. In addition, the sale supports 3-4 major undergraduate scholarships each year to returning adult women students. We accept cash, checks, and major credit cards. Parking is free.

They explained how books about painful or difficult subjects can help children to develop empathy, remind them that they are not alone, and help them overcome challenges as they mature.
